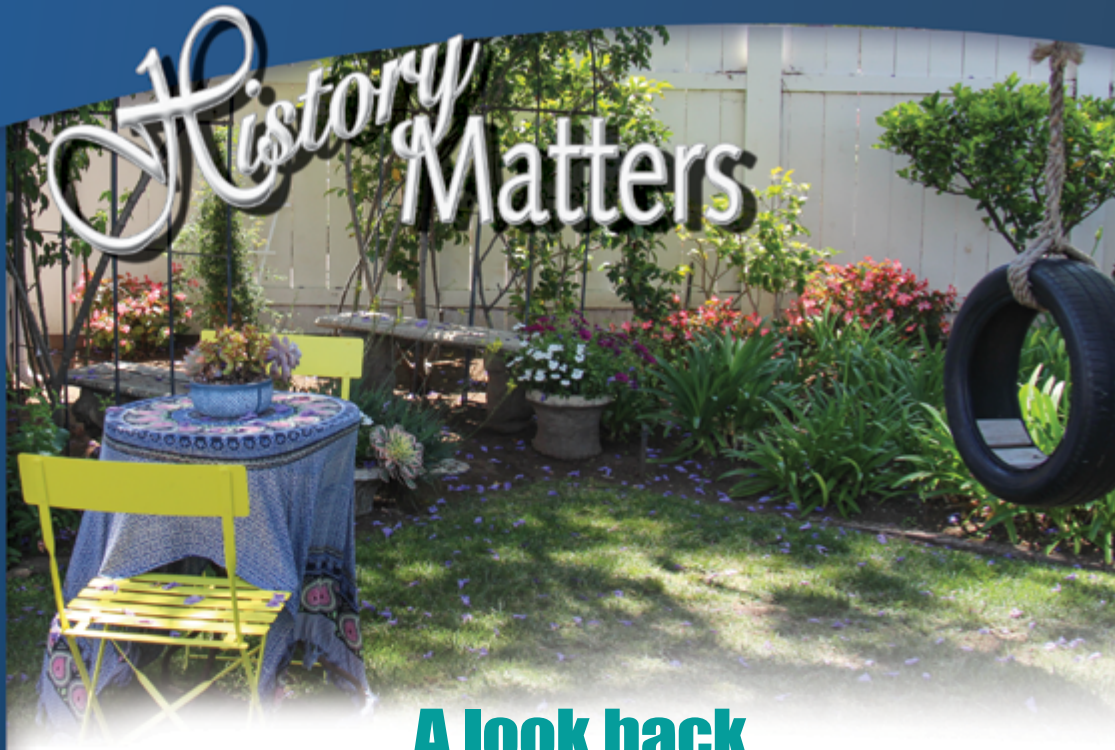

HOLLYWOOD MEETS CORONADO

The story of Bettye Trowbridge Vaughen and the 60th anniversary of the Villa Capri

As the sun rose above Coronado on July 26, 1956 it was going to be a very good day for Bettye Vaughen and for Coronado. The day would be sunny, temperature in the mid-70s with a light breeze—another perfect day in Coronado. Perfect also for a Grand Opening Celebration for the sparkling new “Villa Capri by the Sea” hotel at 1417 Orange Avenue.

Bettye, in her mid-30s, had overseen every detail of construction of this fourteen unit “home away from home” as she defined it. Her contractor, Mayor Walter Vestal, had complied with every detail Bettye had requested, including a purple elevated stairway over the swimming pool, to the second floor. There was even a neon sign out front with a diving bathing beauty, and one doesn’t see that very often! Early evening came, with arriving guests and dignitaries anticipating a “Hollywood Style” party—Bettye knew all about those, as we’ll soon explain. The pool area soon filled with guests enjoying libations and a good time; reliable reports are that as the evening continued, a few folks actually ended up in the pool! Not unusual for the party Bettye envisioned, though perhaps a bit unusual for Coronado in the days when Dwight Eisenhower was President.

We’ll get back to the Villa Capri and how it came to be, but since one may be wondering why Bettye would desire a “Hollywood Style” party, it’s time to tell her story—and what a story it is!

In 1935, Bettye and her mother were living in Los Angeles, and the growing influence of Hollywood was being felt throughout the area. Bettye, being a precocious thirteen-year-old, announced to all who would listen that she was going to be a “glamour girl” in the showbiz world of Hollywood. She was beautiful, and a few years later as a student at Fairfax High School, she was selected for a modeling job. This was her once-in-a-lifetime lucky break; her beauty and poise served her well.

Bettye would have a life full of extraordinary moments. One such moment happened while living her dream in her new world on a

photo shoot for *Look Magazine* in Waikiki. The date: December 7, 1941. With this terrible day of infamy at Pearl Harbor, she was quickly evacuated back to California. The life of a Hollywood Starlet continued for Bettye; she had an agent assisting her career along with others including Rita Hayworth and Cary Grant, she partied with Lucy and Desi, and dated Howard Hughes—all part of the glamorous life she had envisioned.



Not long after her marriage, she was up for a major role in “Red River” with John Wayne when she found she was pregnant and unable to handle the strenuous role. Her modeling and career aspirations would give way to her mothering instinct, and Bettye would go on to raise six children. She had found success in both Hollywood and motherhood!

Now, the rest of the Villa Capri story. By the mid-50s, Bettye was living in Coronado while her husband, a Navy pilot, was flying out of North Island. As Naval activities were growing and evolving, Bettye noted there was a lack of affordable housing for families, business people, and vacationers as they passed through Coronado. Deciding to do what she could to address the issue, she and her mother, who had been active in real estate, managed to purchase 7,500 square feet of what had been part of the Spreckels’ Mansion tropical garden on Orange Avenue.



Bettye designed the Villa Capri for a comfortable stay, long or short, so the fourteen units included full kitchen suites to standard rooms, with one even named the “John Wayne Room.” Once completed, her attention to detail included getting on her knees to demonstrate to her housekeeping staff how she wanted the floors

scrubbed—no detail was too small for Bettye. The Grand Opening was a huge success, and the first year found the hotel fully booked every night as Honeywell Corporation carried out a large contract on North Island.

Preservation

During a time of much development and rebuilding on Coronado, preservation of historic properties is more important than ever. Coronado Historical Association and the City of Coronado's Historic Resource Commission both share a common goal to preserve and protect Coronado's rich history, but they are quite different in the process of historic preservation.

Coronado Historical Association (CHA) is a 501(c)3 nonprofit founded in 1969 to promote Coronado's cultural heritage and resources to the public. Preservation is promoted at the Historic Homes Tour held on Mother's Day. The GEM "Going the Extra Mile" Award is given annually to homeowners who have renovated to preserve the integrity of the original historic home. CHA also hosts an annual Preservation Symposium in partnership with the City of Coronado and Coronado MainStreet during National Preservation Month in May each year.

The Historic Resource Commission (HRC) is a Coronado City Council appointed commission of five members whose goal is to preserve, maintain, and enhance Coronado's unique architectural history. The HRC was created in 2000 by the Historic Preservation Ordinance to establish procedures and criteria for designation of historic structures and allowable alterations to the structures. Through the HRC, homeowner's may apply for historic designation, alterations to historic resources, demolition review, and the Historic Resource Preservation (Mills Act) Agreement.

427 A Avenue

427 A Avenue was constructed in 1912 and was designated as an example of the Craftsman Bungalow style, and for its association with Mary Carlin King-Ross, who was noted for her civic work.



855 Alameda Boulevard

855 Alameda Boulevard was built in 1936. The home was designated as an example of the French Eclectic architectural style; and as a notable work of the architectural firm of Hurlburt, Frank, and Slaughter.

601 Fourth Street

Built in 1926, 601 Fourth Street was designated as a Historic Resource as an example of the Tudor architectural style, and as an example of the notable work of the designer, Franciska Croxall.



924 H Avenue

924 H Avenue was constructed in 1886 and designated as a Special Element of the City's history as the first residential structure completed in Coronado. It was also noted as historically significant for its association with Joseph H. Hartupee, who was a founding father in the City of Coronado.



323 J Avenue

323 J Avenue was constructed in 1932 and designated as an example of the Spanish Eclectic style, and as representative of the notable work of building designer, Virgil Cash, and the builder, Alfred Laing, Sr.



808 Third Street

808 Third Street was built in 1913. The home was designated as an example of the Craftsman Bungalow architectural style; and as an example of the notable work of the builder, Andrew Watson Woods.

History of the Coronado Independence Day Parade

Ask any resident of Coronado and he or she will tell you that the highlight of their summer is the Fourth of July Parade. The entire island shuts down for a weekend of family, food, fun, and celebration. This Coronado tradition began as early as 1888 when ladies put together a "Liberty Float." Businesses and homes decorated with flags and bunting much like they do today. An estimated 11,000 people watched the parade from ferries, cars on the Belt Line, and the streets. The parade worked its way down Orange Avenue to Star Park Circle, down Loma to the Hotel del Coronado.

In 1965 more than 55,000 people came out to watch and celebrate the annual Fourth of July during its Diamond Jubilee Celebration year. In the archive, Nancy Cuddy graciously donated a handwritten, illustrated note from her father, Colonel Alexander G. Kirby, to his grandchildren describing one of the livelier Fourth of July Parades on Coronado.

The parade in 1972 included an elephant, a monkey, and girls riding horses. According to Col. Kirby, the horses were nervous around the elephant. When the elephant bellowed and jumped, he dislodged his rider holding the monkey. The elephant barged through yards and crashed through fences. The handler eventually caught up to him and loaded the elephant back into its transport truck, and the parade took off without its intended elephant!

Fortunately there were no elephants in this year's parade!

CHA in The Classroom!

When did you first start loving history? At CHA, we are committed sharing our history with everyone in Coronado—especially its youngest citizens. Since 2009, the Coronado Historical Association has offered a 3rd Grade History Program to local elementary schools. This annual program began in 2009 and is sanctioned by the Coronado Unified School District. CHA is proud to offer this program at no charge to participating local elementary schools.

In 2016, over 250 third grade students participated in the program. Since the programs inception, an estimated 1,750 students have participated in the 3rd Grade History Program. Katelynn Estrada visited eight classrooms from April to June and taught a three-day history program that focused on local history from its very beginnings to the present. The sessions concluded a walking field trip of the Hotel del Coronado and the Coronado Historical Association, Museum of History & Art.



This year, eight 3rd grade classes from Village Elementary, Silver Strand Elementary and Sacred Heart Parish School participated and learned about local history and the origins of its most beloved traditions and citizens. Through photographs, maps and handling real artifacts, students got a first hand look into the history of our town.
